FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Dear Partners in the Gospel,

This month I give my column up to the Rev. Harvard Stephens, ELCA Chaplain at Carthage College in Kenosha. His words are timely and a welcome response to incidents of racism in our society.

WE STILL HAVE ROOM FOR AN EASTER PARADE (Luke 24:1-12)

I grew up in a small working class community that cherished the annual ritual we called "the Easter parade." This was not an actual promenade down our neighborhood streets. No, this ritual appeared in the shared values of Christian families who maintained an unspoken agreement that they would acknowledge the coming of Easter by wearing something new. Some Easter outfits were more fashionable and expensive than others, but this was not an occasion for discrimination

against poor families. Every family was invited to simply do their best to help everyone shine a little Easter light. With this memory in mind, I'd like to suggest that today in our present context, we still have room for an Easter parade.

Today I want to recognize the two angels we read about in Luke 24, the ones described as wearing dazzling clothes. They are the ones who set the Easter story into motion, and they are perhaps the prototypical leaders of the Easter parade. They are the ones that Luke records speaking the wonderful words: "why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here, but he has risen!" The implication is clearly: "go and find him" - or perhaps even: "go, he will find you." How wonderful it is that a day that started off with such great sadness could turn into a time of tremendous celebration. Isn't it great to have such a reason to celebrate?

On April 3, 2007, the NCAA Division One Women's Basketball Tournament ended with a hard fought victory: Tennessee, the top ranked team with the highly decorated head coach, defeated Rutgers, perhaps a squad of lesser talent that showed gritty determination by winning a berth in the final game. Tennessee was by all accounts the more heralded program, but Rutgers showed great heart and a marvelous competitive spirit. Both teams walked away with much to celebrate. The following day, I did not hear the now infamous comments that radio personality Don Imus made, but I've certainly read about them. He and his on-air confederate made an unusually crude attempt at being funny, and their thoroughly racist and sexist humor was offered at the expense of the student athletes of the Rutgers women's basketball team. His remarks seemed to target Black women, but they really took aim at all women who seem to appear powerless to defend themselves against ridicule, verbal sexual assault and public humiliation.

When I watched the women from Rutgers speak at a press conference a few days later, I thought about the women who are student athletes at Carthage College where I serve as campus pastor. I thought about the teenage girls my wife mentors in our local public schools. I thought about their parents, teachers and coaches. And I thought about how easily the precious democratic right of free speech had been exploited to take so much away from the Rutgers women who were entitled to celebrate their grand and unprecedented achievement.

I do thank God, however, that I was able to rejoice in the powerful eloquence these young women displayed under the intense scrutiny of the media. One woman said: "we're here because of something that should never have happened." I suppose that on the first Easter, other women were prepared to say something quite similar. Jesus was an innocent man; he was victim of an unjust system; his public humiliation was supposed to serve as a warning to other would-be messiahs. How inspiring to hear the Rutgers captain, Ms. Essence Carson, capture the true essence of this moment with these poignant and wise words: "don't recognize us in a light as dimly lit as this!"

Celebrate with me, my friends, that in the midst of all the questions and controversies surrounding this incident, these students were able to articulate in a wonderful way that hope is alive in a world that still yearns to crucify the innocent and berate the beauty and gifts of people of color. A brilliant light seemed to adorn these proud women, revealing something we all can celebrate: the profound vision of a band of sisters, women supported by their families and teachers and community, women much like those who first gave the world the message of Easter. These college students showed their spiritual kinship with the women of Darfur and Baghdad and women of every time and every place who are determined to defy the humiliations so easily cast upon them. The Rutgers women reminded us again of the wonderful biblical claim that there is a light that shines in the darkness, and the darkness does not overcome it.

Actually, as I dare to have faith that God's redemptive grace will continue to work powerfully in this situation, my thoughts turn again to the mysterious angels who reminded us on Easter morning that hope can sometimes be rekindled when we put on something dazzling. In this life, we may never know what it is that angels wear with such amazing grace, but the student athletes of Rutgers have demonstrated that perhaps the most dazzling garment of all is something called DIGNITY. Somebody knows what I'm talking about: in the year 2007, we still have room for an Easter parade!

Easter blessings and joy!
See you at worship!

BREAD FOR THE WORLD—A CHRISTIAN VOICE FOR ENDING HUNGER

Bread for the World members help hungry people by lobbying our nation's decision-makers on legislation that addresses hunger in our communities and around the world.

Bread for the World is supported by more than 45 denominations and church agencies. St. Stephen the Martyr Lutheran Church is a member of Bread for the World.

Each year we ask members to write letters to their representatives in Congress. This year we will be sending letters to encourage them to make changes in the Farm Bill.

The title of the 2007 offering of letters is "Seeds of Change."

This year Congress is expected to reauthorize or renew the Farm Bill. The purpose of this bill is to help US farmers, but over time it has become less and less successful at doing so. It includes commodity payments, which are cash payments made to farmers growing mostly 5 crops: corn, wheat, cotton, rice and soybeans. These payments are to protect farmers from low prices by making up the difference between a target price and the actual market price. These cash payments have shifted dramatically to the very largest farms, which are often the wealthiest farmers.

Farmers who need payments the least are receiving the most, and 2/3 of the US farmers receive no payments.

Because this payment system encourages US farmers to concentrate on the 5 crops, world markets are being flooded with these crops, which are sold at prices lower than what it costs to produce them.

It is being suggested that we need a broader, more equitable safety net that works better for small and moderate farms. US farmers who want to grow other crops such as pears, pecans, barley or broccoli should have the same safety net as those who grow the 5 program crops in the current bill. This bill should also promote conservation and improved land use.

The other part of the Farm Bill is the Food Stamp program. An increase in the funding of this program could enable the program to reach more people at the risk of hunger. An increase could also allow families who receive food stamp benefits to afford a more nutritious diet. The food stamp program could provide incentives to purchase fruits and vegetables that would strengthen local and regional farm to market connections.

Please plan to write a letter on May 19th or 20th to our members in Congress.

We will provide paper, pens, envelopes, stamps, and a copy of the letter to be written.

UGANDAN AIDS CRISIS

There is an **URGENT** and **IMMEDIATE** need to buy medication for Ugandans who have HIV/AIDS. The Immune Suppression Syndrome Clinic in Mbarara, Uganda has asked the Family Treatment Fund to come to its aid. SSM has been a supporter of FTF which was founded by AIDS Doctor, David Bangsberg, cousin of SSM Member, Sara Raasch.

Because a shipment of medicine has not arrived in Uganda, there are 1400 patients who may be turned away for their monthly supply of Triomune-30. The Family Treatment Fund is able to buy medication from another clinic -but needs funds to do so. For every \$200 raised one person will live another year.

An interruption in antiretroviral therapy will likely result in death.

The next major church holiday is Pentecost, which falls on Memorial Day weekend, this year. Wear red to the service and celebrate! There will be communion on Saturday night and at the only Sunday service at 9:30 a.m..

On Pentecost, many people comment on the attractive appearance of the red paraments, banners and flowers. Parishioners are only guaranteed red paraments on two weekends of the church year: Pentecost (May or June/ 50 days after Easter) and Reformation (last Sunday in October). In a sense, both events are birthday celebrations...the birthday of the Christian Church and the birthday of the Lutheran Church. Occasionally red occurs at other times. If a martyred saint's day falls on Sunday, the color is red. This happened December 26, 2004, which is St. Stephen the Martyr's Saint's Day. Some years there are no Martyr (red) Sundays. Sometimes a season like Lent will overshadow the use of red. In 2007 there will be no other red except for Reformation Sunday (October 28th).

Sunday, June 3rd --- Trinity Sunday (white), we will have one service at 9:30AM and the Church school will meet for the last time until Fall.

Sunday, June 10th begins the Summer schedule, with one Sunday service at 9:30AM (note the new time) along with the regular Saturday 5:00PM service.

3-4-5 TO PASSING ON THE FAITH

(from Frogs without legs Can't Hear by David W. Anderson & Paul Hill)

This is a beginning of a continuous journey that we will be going through in this series each month. It is taken from the Youth & Family Ministry Certification course that I have been a part of over the last year. Each month we will look at a different aspect of it and what it takes to pass on our faith.

We will start with the first of 5 principles which is 'Faith is formed by the power of the Holy Spirit through personal, trusted relationships. Starting out we will look into the Bible to the beginning of Christ's ministry where he calls his first disciples. In John 1:35-44 we see John the Baptist telling two of his own disciples to look at Jesus and see the Lamb of God. When Jesus asks them what they are looking for, they basically say that they seek a teacher of faith. So Jesus invites them to follow him and see.

As they go along they come to Simon, whose brother, Andrew, tells him that they have found the Messiah. Jesus then changes Simon's name to Peter. The next day as they are walking they come to find Phillip, to whom Christ the Messiah says to follow him. Phillip, being from the same town as Peter and Andrew, trusted them. Phillip then goes to find Nathanael to tell him about the one of whom Moses and the prophets wrote.

All of these invitations to see and follow Jesus are examples of personal trusted relationships at work. We have received our faith from the Holy Spirit by watching those to whom we are close: our parents, grandparents, other relatives, our close friends. We make new friends through those people who we meet at school, at our jobs and in our congregation. How many times do we go to a new restaurant, see a movie, watch a tv show just because our friends have told us about it? As we want our youth to have faith, we have to show them what it is to be faithful by letting them see us living out our faith. This is the first of the five principles: faith is formed by personal trusted relationships. As we discussed this at certification school, we came to realize that this is the foundation upon which are built all of the other principles for passing on the faith. From this we see the rest of the principles, keys and what it means to be a AAA adult. And more on those in this series.

CONDENSED COUNCIL MINUTES

CONDENSED MINUTES OF COUNCIL MTG. HELD ON APRIL 10, 2007

(A complete set of Minutes can be found on the Bulletin Board in the Narthex.)

All Council members were present except Carol Malinowski. Kevan Penrose was not in attendance.

Special guest, Gary Fedder, consultant to the Greendale School District & former Fire Chief of Greendale, addressed the Council. SSM has agreed to be an evacuation point for the College Park Elementary School. Mr. Fedder discussed the fact that SSM would only be a point of pick-up for the children. He also strongly suggested that SSM install a lockbox that would contain a key to our building. The Greendale Fire Dept. would be the only group to have a key to the lockbox.

Having a lockbox would be a direct benefit to SSM should there be an emergency on our premises that would require entry into our building before a member would arrive with a key. Several public buildings & churches in Greendale have already installed a lockbox. The Council agreed that our Property Chair should look into purchasing & installing a lockbox. Approvals: The Secretary's minutes from March 13, 2007 were approved as written. The Financial Secretary's Report was reviewed & accepted. The Treasurer's Report was discussed. J. Arneson, Property Chair, reported a \$500 repair bill for our furnace. Jim also brought up projected expenses for the repair & sealing of our parking lots. A representative from Merit Asphalt met with Jim & discussed a modified possibility for repairing the Upper Parking lot at a cost of approximately \$14,000. It

does not pay to seal it in its current condition. A special fund raising appeal will have to be made to the congregation. The lower lot will be sealed & handicapped parking remarked at a cost of \$2,275. It was moved, seconded & approved to accept the Treasurer's Report. Pastor's Time: A heartfelt thank you for all the volunteer activity over the Lenten & Easter season, to K. Rasmussen & the Music & Worship Committee & to all the worship helpers, the musicians for all the music & to those who helped in any way with the Easter Breakfast. Thanks also to Susan Mitchell for helping teach the pre-communion classes to the 4th & 5th graders. Paul Kwiecien, Director of Greater Milwaukee Synod Outreach for Hope Fund will preach on April 28-29. Pastor Hartmut Barsnick, Athenstedt, Germany will preach on May 5-6.
