SEASON'S GREETINGS!

What a great and beautiful season Fall is! I say that as I sit sweltering in my office in mid August. (Ah...the AC just kicked in!) Even though we hate to see Summer leave, as God's people it's good to look forward to many exciting things going on at our church this Fall.

Do join in worship on Rally Day, Sept. 9th as we praise God in the great outdoors and enjoy some great food and fellowship inside afterward. Sign up now to bring a dish and if you can, to help with set-up or clean-up.....Sunday School begins this day, after children are dismissed from worship with a children's sermon and the installation of some veteran and new teachers. We are so grateful for their faithful service to the Lord and to the kids!

Third graders will meet with their teacher and me to learn how to use the Bibles they will receive on the first Sunday in October. New members will be received in October, and our Stewardship Campaign will be in full swing.

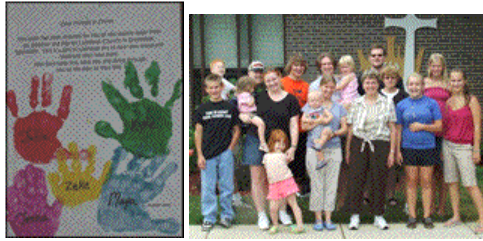
DATE: October 12-13

Braving the heat of the upstairs low-income apartments, we completed the remodeling of one of the units, making it ready for tenants who need a fresh start to move in this fall. The youngest kids (age 1-5) donated dry goods to the food pantry. They also made photo books and wall hangings to welcome the tenants into their new homes, sharing with them God's guiding hand of preparing their way.

With all the hard work, we also played hard and prayed hard at Imago Dei family camp on beautiful Long Lake in Clintonville. Worship and campfires were uplifting, and we all grew closer to one another and to Jesus. Many who could not travel this year still participated by being prayer partners, donating to the mission trip fund, welcoming home the travel team at the potluck dinner, and worshipping with us on Sunday. A low estimate puts us a 200 people being directly involved in our congregational mission trip.

His Eye is On the Sparrow

Hymn By Civilla D. Martin, 1869-1948

Mrs. Martin, author of this gospel hymn text, tells of a visit in 1904 to a bedridden friend. Mrs. Martin asked the friend if she ever got discouraged because of her physical condition. Her friend responded quickly: "Mrs. Martin, how can I be discouraged when my heavenly Father watches over each little sparrow and I know He loves and cares for me." Within just a few minutes Mrs. Martin completed the writing of her new text, which has since been a source of encouragement to many Christians. "Why should I feel discouraged, why should the shadows come, why should my heart be lonely and long for Heaven and home, when Jesus is my portion? My constant Friend is He: His eye is on the sparrow, and I know He watches me; His eye is on the sparrow, and I know He watches me. I sing because I'm happy, I sing because I'm free, For His eye is on the sparrow, and I know He watches me." Rest and rejoice in the assurance of God's love. Seek to bring a word of cheerful encouragement to some sick individual. Remind him or her of God's loving concern and the truth of this beautiful song. (taken from "Amazing Grace" by Osbeck)



WHAT IS AUTISM? WOULD YOU KNOW IT IF YOU SAW IT?

Autism is a lifelong, neurological disorder that significantly affects how a person perceives the world, interacts with other people, and communicates. It's often referred to as a spectrum disorder, meaning the symptoms and characteristics of autism can present themselves in a wide variety of combinations, from mild to severe. Autism and its associated disabilities, such as Asperger Syndrome and Pervasive Developmental Disorder, Not Otherwise Specified (PDD-NOS), occur in approximately 1 out of every 150 individuals. Autism is four times more prevalent in boys than in girls and knows no racial, ethnic, or social boundaries. More children will be diagnosed with autism this year than with AIDS, diabetes & cancer combined, yet autism receives less than 5% of the research funding of many less prevalent childhood diseases. There is no single, specific cause of autism so it has been nearly impossible to find a cure at this point.

Two years ago this month our son, Kyle, was diagnosed with PDD-NOS. When he was about 18 months old Kyle lost the 6 words he was able to speak, he would not play with other children, he didn't make eye contact with anyone and absolutely nothing scared him. Today Kyle looks a "normal" 4 year old boy to almost everyone that sees him, however developmentally he is functioning on about a 2½ to a 3 year old level (which is a HUGE gain from last year!).

Having a child on the autism spectrum has completely changed our lives, just like having any special needs child does. Each day usually brings new challenges, such as trying to find yet another lock for the refrigerator and pantry that Kyle cannot break through or figuring out a new place to hide the crayons so he does not eat them all again, and also great successes like hearing Kyle say "I love you Mommy" for the very first time when he was 3 years old. It has unfortunately become fairly common when we go out that we hear comments from other people about the way Kyle is behaving or we get strange looks from people because Kyle did not answer them when they asked him a question. When we tell these people that Kyle is on the autism spectrum the most common response we hear is "Wow! Really? He doesn't look autistic." Unlike many other disabilities there are no physical signs of autism, this can make it extremely difficult to identify someone on the autism spectrum.

At the beginning of this year a friend, who has 2 daughters on the autism spectrum, and I started a support group for parents in the area who have children on the spectrum because neither one of us could find a group in the area. Our group, Autism Parents of Southeast Wisconsin, meets once a month for dinner without children and we also have another get together with our children and our families. We have grown from our 4 original members in February to close to 30 members today.

Our next big outing with our families is going to be held at the 7th Annual Dylan's Run/Walk for Autism on September 9th at the Summerfest Grounds. We currently have 33 walkers and runners on our team, including our members and their families and friends. All of the money raised for Dylan's Run goes to help fund autism research, training and raising awareness right here in Wisconsin. Imagine not being able to zip up your pants or not being able to fold your shopping list to put it in your purse. Think about not being able to drive a car and consequently being at the mercy of the bus schedule or the schedule of friends and family. These are a few of the many challenges facing people with Cerebral Palsy. While their lives can be frustrating, there are community organizations that exist to help handicap persons meet and adapt to these challenges. One such organization is United Cerebral Palsy (UCP)

Joe's Run is a fundraiser for United Cerebral Palsy. This agency has been serving people with disabilities and their families for over fifty years. They help people with disabilities to reach the goal of independent living—to live, work and play independently and to freely participate in all the community offers.

Vickie Lawrence, a disabled member of our congregation, benefits greatly from the services of this organization. Each year she participates in this run to give back to the agency which supports her. The Human Concerns committee asks that individual members support her and UCP by pledging money for this run.

Vicki along with other members of the Human Concerns committee will be in church Sunday September 8 and Sunday September 15. Donations will be accepted and greatly appreciated at this time. If you are unable to be in church either of these Sundays; donations can be left in the church office in an envelope labeled Joe's Run.

EVERYBODY OUGHT TO GO TO SUNDAY SCHOOL.....

Have you ever wondered where Sunday School originated? Sunday schools began as the first schools for poor children in England around 1780. The schools also provided elementary instruction to working adults on their free day. By the 1790's there were several of these schools in the United States.

Sunday schools not only taught the Bible, reading and writing, they taught proper behavior, enforcing cleanliness, providing Sunday clothing to the poor, and reprimanding children for lying, swearing, talking in an indecent manner, or other misbehavior. By 1820, there were hundreds of Sunday schools in the U.S. It was believed that teaching the Bible was essential for moral living and good citizenship. Knowledge of the Bible, they felt, would teach students the duty required of them as social, rational and accountable beings. Teachers encouraged students to commit to memory large portions of the Bible for which weekly prizes were awarded to those who memorized the largest number of verses.

Proverbs 22:6 reinforces the importance of early training in forming a person's lifelong character: "Train up a child in the way he/she should go [and in keeping with his/her individual gift or bent], and when he/she is old he/she will not depart from it." (Amplified Version)
